While juggling AP coursework, sports, theatre, yearbook, and a slew of other commitments, the seniors spent weeks planning the assembly that included Lower School, Middle School, and Upper School.

The assembly included a short video on women's history, a scene from the upcoming Upper School play *A Raisin in the Sun*, Ms. Breslauer, an LWA alum and Lower School Assistant Principal, singing "When You Believe," an all-division dance choreographed by Ciara, a lively Jeopardy-style game that tested students on their knowledge of famous women, a video showcasing members of the LWA community sharing their favorite part of being a woman, and a reading of Maya Angelou's "Phenomenal Woman." TIPS, TRIVIA, AND COMMUNITY CHALLENGE

TIPS

To conclude our newsletter and in honor of Women's History Month, we wanted to share a few tips regarding educating children about gender equality. As with most aspects of education, gender equality begins at home. Having candid conversations, sharing the housework, and interrogating gender norms are just some of the ways you can ensure that your children grow up in a gender-just world.

1) Open Dialogue

Children are constantly bombarded by stereotypical gender images and norms via the media. One of the best ways to combat this insidious propaganda is to be open and candid with your children regarding societal gender stereotypes and gender inequality. It is important to recognize that not a single country in the world has yet achieved gender equality. On a global level, there's been <u>little progress</u> on gender equality since the Global Goals were signed in 2015. For instance, women still earn only 77 cents for every dollar men earn.

It is up to us to educate our children about the significance of women's rights, so they can help build a society that is truly just. And don't be afraid to break down the stereotypes at home - dads can be vulnerable, and moms can be strong. Researchers say, children start absorbing stereotypes by age 3, causing the world to expand for boys and shrink for girls by age 10. That's why conversations about gender roles should start early and never end.

2) Dads Do Dishes Too!

Women are responsible for at least 2.5 times more unpaid household and care work than men. In 2020, school, preschool, and daycare closures led to an additional estimated <u>512 billion hours</u> of unpaid childcare globally for women. That's over 57,000 decades of unpaid work. Thousands of women and girls miss out on equal opportunities to go to school, work, or simply relax. Teach your children the importance of equitable distribution of housework by setting the right example and involving both sons and daughters in chores.

3) Discuss the unrealistic beauty expectations created by social media.

While all genders are impacted by beauty standards, often young women are more vulnerable to the pernicious effects. In a recent must-read article in *The Atlantic* titled "End the Phone-Based Childhood Now," an essayist, Freya India, is quoted: "It seems like your child is simply watching some makeup tutorials, following some mental health influencers, or experimenting with their identity. But let me tell you: they are on a conveyor belt to someplace bad. Whatever insecurity or vulnerability they are struggling with, they will be pushed further and further into it." So, be vigilant about what your children are engaged with on social media, and make a habit of rejecting sexist and negative stereotypes of physical beauty.
